From Your Pastor

What came first—the church or the mission?

If you visit the Holy Land (and I hope you do—I'll lead another tour in a few years), there's something you will *not* see there—not anywhere. No matter how hard you look, you won't find a church building (or even the *ruins* of a church building) with a historical marker declaring, "This church was founded by Jesus Christ himself." Even when you walk through the ruins of the synagogue in Capernaum—the Galilee town that was Jesus' home base during his adult years—that synagogue was built about a century *after* the time of Jesus. It's not the same synagogue Jesus taught in while in Capernaum.

And yet for Christians today, the primary identity of any church community is the <u>building</u> in which they meet for worship services week by week.

Jesus was never commissioned to be a "founding pastor" for a "new church development." He never registered a bunch of charter members, or ran a capital campaign, or oversaw the construction of a church building.

So how is it, then, that the memory of Jesus of Nazareth has not merely survived the millennia but has spread world-wide? Without an historical "mother church" to point to as the epicenter of Christianity, how have Christ-believers continued to impact and influence the world?

During one of our trips while on my sabbatical this summer, I heard a speaker who said something that stayed with me for months.

For two weeks we were at Lakeside-on-Lake-Erie, the United Methodist Chautauqua on the Marblehead peninsula between Sandusky and Port Clinton. Lakeside's programming always includes a "Minister of the Week." For our second week at Lakeside the Minister of the Week was Becca Stevens, a priest in the Episcopal Church. Your image of Episcopalians may be stodgy, rigid, urbane East Coast-types. Not Becca. Now living in Nashville, Tennessee, Becca is an Episcopal priest with country charm and a heartwarming southern drawl. At the Sunday morning worship service in the 3,000-seat Hoover Auditorium, she kicked off her sandals while she preached. And after delivering the benediction, when she and the other worship leaders walked to the back of the auditorium Becca was carrying her sandals in her hands. No pretentiousness here—Becca's "down-home" wherever she is.

Twenty years ago Becca founded a ministry to women who had experienced trafficking, prostitution, prison, violence, or addiction. Her organization is called "Thistle Farms." Thistle Farms welcomes women by providing free housing, medical care, therapy and education... for *two years*! Residents and graduates earn income through Thistle Farms' "social enterprises"—businesses operated to generate income for a social program. Thistle Farms businesses make health & beauty products, jewelry, clothing, housewares, foods and more. (You can see for yourself at https://thistlefarms.org.)

Earlier this year Becca was interviewed for Forbes Magazine. In his article Simon Mainwaring concluded, "Thistle Farms is a great example of how to be a 'mission with a company, rather than a company with a mission'." (You can find that article via an online search.)

Jesus. Show he said and We sho of our company. "God's love God's love God's love Sion'."

It was during a lecture that Becca shared the Forbes Magazine quote about "a mission with a company, rather than a company with a

mission." What immediately popped into my head was a variation on that: What would it mean to be "a mission with a church, rather than a church with a mission"? After all, in seeking to serve God, what's primary is the mission, the purpose. What is secondary is the institution that arises as a result of the mission being pursued.

That's when the thought occurred that what Jesus laid the groundwork for was not an organization based in a particular building. He wasn't trying to "plant churches," to use a term popular in modern Protestant Christianity. What was primary for Jesus was his purpose: showing God's generous love by what he said and by the things he did.

What happened then? Strangers and the curious and disciples and apostles followed Jesus' example: striving to show love through words and actions. A happy consequence resulted from their shared commitment to live like Jesus: they found a common bond that drew them together. What *brought* them together was service and mission, and what *held* them together was the experience

of shared worship and social fellowship.

Like those people of old, we are fed, comforted, inspired, and encouraged through the act of sharing worship time together. As is obvious from the lively conversations that take place before and after worship, we enjoy each other's company and appreciate the opportunity to socialize that comes from the act of gathering together for worship week by week

I hope we always cherish the fellowship we share when we come together as a church to worship and praise God.

Worship is our gift to God, and fellowship is a gift from God. But what draws us together for worship and fellowship? As followers of Jesus our primary focus ought to be our commitment to continuing the mission of Jesus: showing God's generous love by what he said and by the things he did.

We should be known foremost because of our commitment to our mission (showing God's love through words and actions). That

that also has

a church...

commitment to our mission happens to draw us together in fellowship and worship as a body known commonly as a church.

Try picturing yourself as part of "Rocky River Pres-

byterian Mission." As a "mission" we embody a committed effort to spread Christ's love. And that committed effort—that mission—happens to have produced a "church," a "family of faith" bound together by shared friendship and compassionate concern for one another.

Like our lungs breathe in, then breathe out... breathe in... out... so Jesus sends us out to serve the world, the brings us together for worship and fellowship... sends us out... brings us together... sent out... brought together....

See you in church... so we can each be sent out in mission yet again.




You are Invited to The Dougbe River School of Liberia Annual Gala Sunday October 27 (5-7:30p.m.)

How many monthly payments do you make electronically?

Did know you can add your monthly church offering to the list—you can save the time and trouble of writing your offering check every week or month, and you won't have to wonder, "Did I remember to make that gift?"

Our Financial Secretary Dave Wolfe can assist you with setting up a monthly Electronic Fund Transfer ("EFT," sometimes called an "ACH" for "automated clearing house"). An EFT gives the church's bank permission to draw your pre-authorized amount from your account on a specific day each month.

- \Rightarrow No fees to pay
- ⇒ You can <u>adjust</u> or <u>stop</u> the EFT at any time just by calling the church.

Healthy Happenings

... Notes from the Parish Nurse

Dear Friends and Family,

Greetings! E-cigarettes are posing a significant health risk throughout the United States and unfortunately, our teens and young adult are at risk of starting this potentially deadly habit. Many teens and young adults do not realize that just like regular cigarettes, e-cigarettes contain nicotine, which is the highly addictive drug in tobacco. Nicotine is especially harmful to young people. The human brain keeps developing until around the age of 25. Using products with nicotine under age 25 can harm the part of the brain responsible for memory, attention, and learning.

Many young people who use e-cigarettes also smoke regular cigarettes. There is evidence that young people who use e-cigarettes may be more likely to smoke regular cigarettes in the future. Also, even though the liquid that e-cigarettes heat to form an aerosol (vapor) has fewer harmful ingredients than cigarette smoke, it still contains harmful ingredients including heavy metals and even cancer-causing chemical that can be breathed deep into the lungs. The part of the e-cigarette that heats up may also explode or cause serious burns.

What is an e-cigarette?

- Electronic cigarettes or e-cigarettes work by heating a liquid to produce an aerosol that users inhale into their lungs.
- The liquid can contain nicotine, tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) and cannabinoid (CBD) oils, and other substances, flavorings, and additives.
- E-cigarettes are also called vapes, e-hookahs, vape pens, tank systems, mods, and electronic nicotine delivery systems (ENDS).

What is vaping?

- Using an e-cigarette is commonly called vaping.
- Vaping can refer to using e-cigarettes to inhale many substances, including nicotine, and THC or CBD oils.

What is causing this outbreak of lung injury?

- All reported cases have a history of e-cigarette product use, or vaping.
- The investigation has not identified any specific product or substance that is linked to all cases.
- Most, but not all, patients have reported using e-cigarettes containing THC. Many reports using THC and nicotine. Some report using nicotine containing products only.

How can I protect myself?

- Until we know more, if you are concerned about these specific health risks, CDC recommends that you consider refraining from using e-cigarette or vaping products.
- Anyone who uses an e-cigarette or vaping product should not buy these products (e.g., e-cigarette or vaping products with THC or CBD oils) off the street and should not modify or add any substances to these products that are not intended by the manufacturer.
- If you are an adult who uses e-cigarettes because you have quit cigarette smoking do not return to smoking cigarettes.

What should I do if I have used e-cigarettes and have symptoms?

- See a healthcare provider right away if you have symptoms like those reported in this outbreak.
- You can also call your local poison control center at 1-800-222-1222.
- You can also submit a detailed report of any unexpected health or product issues related to tobacco or e-cigarette products to the FDA via the online Safety Reporting: Portalexternal icon.

What if I'm an adult who quit cigarette smoking and now uses e-cigarettes?

- If you are an adult who uses e-cigarettes because you have quit cigarette smoking, do not return to smoking cigarettes.
- If you continue to use e-cigarettes, carefully monitor yourself for symptoms and see a healthcare provider right away. Symptoms may include: a cough, shortness of breath, chest pain, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, abdominal pain, fatigue and fever.
