day gets its name from an optional tradition of receiving a mark of ashes on the forehead or hand as a sign of repentance.

Our brief communion service on Ash Wednesday is at 7:30 p.m. The service takes place in our sanctuary—in a special worship configuration set up in the chancel ("stage") area of the church.

From Your Pastor

"How do I serve thee? Let me count the ways...."

The above title gives a tip of the cap to Elizabeth Barrett Browning (1806-1861) who famously asked in her Sonnet 43 "How do I love thee?"

So, how *do* we serve:

- serve God?
- serve the continuing ministry of Jesus Christ?
- serve the programs, missions and ministries offered in Jesus' name by this particular congregation?

Some might say that we serve through a variety of requests to <u>donate items</u>:

- * collections of hats, gloves, mittens and scarves;
- * collections of toiletries;
- collections of socks, underwear and winter garb for the homeless;
- * collections of non-perishable food for local hunger programs.

Others might say that we serve through a variety of requests to get involved:

- helping at a community meal, perhaps;
- writing greeting cards and packing gifts for families contending with cancer;
- * claiming a spot in the choir loft by joining our Chancel Choir;
- serving as an usher or liturgist for our worship services;
- shepherding little children through a week of Vacation Bible School;
- serving on a church board like the Deacons or Session or Presbyterian Women, or helping with one of their particular duties;
- * decorating the church for Christmas and then helping stow the decorations for another year.

Still others would say that we serve through a series of requests through the year to be generous with our money:

- * making an annual stewardship pledge;
- * giving a special gift toward our congregation's Per Capita expense;
- supporting the PC(USA)'s special offerings for "One Great Hour of

Sharing" (Palm Sunday), "Peace and Global Witness" (World Communion Sunday), and "Christmas Joy" (Advent);

 special appeals like the youth groups' "Souper Bowl of Caring" (February) or the special offering for North Presbyterian Church (June).

E leven years ago elder Anne Anderson Busher said to me, "I would like to organize an event where people can have an alternative to the sense of feeling obligated to spend money on 'meaningless' Christmas gifts. Instead, let them give their money to charities as a way of honoring the people they are gifting."

From that was born RRPC's annual "Alternative Christmas" Charity Bazaar. For the last eleven years, Fellowship Hall has welcomed a dozen or more local, national and global missions and charities on the Sunday before Thanksgiving. Church members could visit their booths to learn more about the mission and then decide which charities to support and how much to give each one.

A few weeks ago I received a note from Anne. She wrote,

"All the money has been accounted for and we have hit another milestone in donations! The 11th Annual "Alternative Christmas" Charity Bazaar raised a total of \$10,561—every penny going to the selected missions. Dear congregation, thank you so much for your amazing generosity. The checks from the church to all of the charities will be sent out soon. So many will benefit from your charity."

Youth mission trip heads to Wisconsin this June

<u>Kids</u>: can you saw a board? Paint a ceiling? Repair a fence? Install a handrail? Cut down a tree? Hammer a nail?

You never know what kind of skills you'll learn on our summer youth mission trip. Led by our pastor and deacon Tracey Kirchner, you'll travel to Sheboygan, Wisconsin ("the Bratwurst Capital of the World!") from Sun., June 21 until Sat., June 27. You'll stay in an air-conditioned facility (probably a public school or church). You'll have hot showers and sleep on cool floors. You'll enjoy yummy meals served cafeteria-style. Daily devotions. Recreation and free time. Make friends with kids from many kinds of churches from all over the USA.

Each day you'll work with other kids to help elderly residents still living in their homes who are unable (physically or financially) to perform repairs and maintenance. You'll do exterior painting, build porches and wheelchair ramps, and general work on the property. Group Mission Trips does a great job organizing these



work camps; that's why we're working with them again.

Parents: sign up your child now. The "list price" is \$475 but fundraising activities will bring that cost *way* down. A \$50 deposit holds a spot for your child.

This month's "hands-on" mission opportunity "Village Project" cares for local families dealing with cancer

- Collection throughout February
- Packing event Sat., Feb. 29th

When someone in your family is dealing with cancer, having nutritious meals provided to you is an enormous relief and source of encouragement. The Village Project walks alongside their clients during their individual cancer journeys. Village Project provides meals and extended services to individuals and their families dealing with cancer in Avon, Avon Lake, Bay Village, Rocky River and Westlake. Clients receive meals designed with health, healing, and maintaining strength in mind. The food is free of processed sugar, white flour and red meat. Meals are prepared by high school students, under the supervision of adult cooks. Each person in the client family receives three full meals with side dishes and a dessert.

Volunteers ("delivery angels") check in with the clients each week when delivering the meals, ensuring their needs are being met or haven't changed. n addition to meals, weekly deliveries contain a letter detailing the menu and ingredients, cards made by children and signed by those who prepared and packaged the meals that week, and often homemade gifts donated by volunteers. During the summer, vases painted by children hold flowers grown in the organic garden.

Village Project runs on volunteers: adult and student cooks, prep teams, "delivery angels."

Healthy Happenings

... Notes from the Parish Nurse

Dear Friends and Family,

Greetings! What's the bottom line on the risks of E-cigarettes for kids, teens, and young adults? First, the use of e-cigarettes is not safe for kids, teens, and young adults. Second, most e-cigarettes contain nicotine. Nicotine is highly addictive and can harm adolescent brain development, which continues into the early to mid-20's. Third, E-cigarettes can contain other harmful substances besides nicotine. Fourth, young people who use e-cigarettes may be more likely to smoke cigarettes in the future.

What are e-cigarettes? E-cigarettes are electronic devices that heat a liquid and produce an aerosol or mix of small particles in the air. E-cigarettes come in many shapes and sizes and most have a battery, a heating element, and a place to hold a liquid. Some e-cigarettes look like regular cigarettes, cigars, or pipes. Some look like USB flash drives, pens, and other everyday items. Larger devices such as tank systems, or "mods," do not look like other tobacco products. E-cigarettes are known by many different names. They are sometimes called "e-cigs," "e-hookahs," "mods," "vape pens," "vapes," "tank systems," and "electronic nicotine delivery systems (ENDS)." Using an e-cigarette is sometimes called "vaping" or "JUULing."

How do e-cigarettes work? E-cigarettes produce an aerosol by heating a liquid that usually contains nicotine, flavorings, and other chemicals that help to make the aerosol. The liquid used in e-cigarettes often contains nicotine and flavorings. This liquid is sometimes called "e-juice," "e-liquid," "vape juice," or "vape liquid." Users inhale e-cigarette aerosol into their lungs. Bystanders can also breathe in this aerosol when the user exhales it into the air. E-cigarette devices can be used to deliver marijuana and other drugs.

Most e-cigarettes contain nicotine, the addictive drug in regular cigarettes, cigars, and other tobacco products. A recent CDC study found that 99% of the e-cigarettes sold in assessed venues in the United States contained nicotine. Some e-cigarette labels do not disclose that they contain nicotine, and some e-cigarettes marketed as containing 0% nicotine have been found to contain nicotine. Nicotine can harm the developing adolescent brain. The brain keeps developing until about age 25. Using nicotine in adolescence can harm the parts of the brain that control attention, learning, mood, and impulse control. Using nicotine in adolescence may also increase risk for future addiction to other drugs. Unfortunately, there is an epic of widespread vaping by students in schools, including classrooms and bathrooms.

Flavors and marketing make e-cigarettes appealing to youth. Many e-cigarettes come in fruit, candy, and other kid-friendly flavors. It's important to know that E-cigarette aerosol is NOT harmless "water vapor." The e-cigarette aerosol that users breathe from the device and exhale can contain harmful and potentially harmful substances, including: Nicotine; Ultrafine particles that can be inhaled deep into the lungs; Flavorings such as diacetyl, a chemical linked to a serious lung disease; Volatile organic compounds; Cancer-causing chemicals; Heavy metals such as nickel, tin, and lead. The aerosol that users inhale and exhale from e-cigarettes can expose both themselves and bystanders to harmful substances. It is difficult for consumers to know what e-cigarette products contain. For example, some e-cigarettes marketed as containing zero percent nicotine have been found to contain nicotine.

How can we prevent our children from using e-cigarettes or to help them stop? Talk to your child or teen about why e-cigarettes are harmful for them. Set a good example by being tobacco-free and ensure that your kid is not exposed to the secondhand emissions from any tobacco products, including e-cigarettes. If you use tobacco, it's never too late to quit. Let your child know that you want them to stay away from all tobacco products, including e-cigarettes, because they are not safe for them.


