## **A Christmas Eve Meditation**

- <u>Isaiah 9:2, 6 New Revised Standard Version</u>
  - <sup>2</sup>The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light;
    those who lived in a land of deep darkness on them light has shined....
    <sup>6</sup> For a child has been born for us, a son given to us;
    authority rests upon his shoulders; and he is named
    Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.
- <u>Luke 2:1-20 Good News Translation</u> At that time Emperor Augustus ordered a census to be taken throughout the Roman Empire. <sup>2</sup>When this first census took place, Quirinius was the governor of Syria. <sup>3</sup> Everyone, then, went to register himself, each to his own hometown. <sup>4</sup> Joseph went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to the town of Bethlehem in Judea, the birthplace of King David. Joseph went there because he was a descendant of David. <sup>5</sup>He went to register with Mary, who was promised in marriage to him. She was pregnant, 6 and while they were in Bethlehem, the time came for her to have her baby. 7 She gave birth to her first son, wrapped him in cloths and laid him in a manger – there was no room for them to stay in the inn. 8 There were some shepherds in that part of the country who were spending the night in the fields, taking care of their flocks. 9 An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone over them. They were terribly afraid, <sup>10</sup> but the angel said to them, "Don't be afraid! I am here with good news for you, which will bring great joy to all the people. <sup>11</sup> This very day in David's town your Savior was born – Christ the Lord! <sup>12</sup> And this is what will prove it to you: you will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger." <sup>13</sup>Suddenly a great army of heaven's angels appeared with the angel, singing praises to God: <sup>14</sup> "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and peace on earth to those with whom he is pleased!" 15 When the angels went away from them back into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let's go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us." <sup>16</sup>So they hurried off and found Mary and Joseph and saw the baby lying in the manger. <sup>17</sup> When the shepherds saw him, they told them what the angel had said about the child. 18 All who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds said. <sup>19</sup> Mary remembered all these things and thought deeply about them. <sup>20</sup> The shepherds went back, singing praises to God for all they had heard and seen; it had been just as the angel had told them.

On this night long ago Mary and Joseph were not where they wanted to be: "at home."

Ironically, you <u>are</u> at home, but you're not where you want to be right now: sitting in church, surrounded by friends and family and

strangers, amid the cozy swirl of carols and candlelight and kisses and hugs and handshakes of Christmas greetings.

Perhaps more than any other Christmas in your life, tonight might, indeed, be a "Silent Night."

But... can you see the blessing to be found in this "Silent Night?"

In the beloved carol "O Little Town of Bethlehem" there is a line that whispers this truth: "How silently, how silently the wondrous gift is given...."

Mary and Joseph welcomed the birth of their baby in the stillness of a stable. No fanfare. No adoring crowds, or relatives or friends. The gift of Jesus came to us quietly, calmly.

That's what we can remember on Christmas this year: even in the relative quiet and stillness of our homes God seeks to enter <u>our</u> lives and fill <u>our</u> hearts with divine, abundant, unstoppable love—love embodied in the baby Jesus, asleep on the hay on this "Silent Night, Holy Night."

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
