From Your Pastor

What differences does it make?

"What difference does it make?"
That's the question one might ask about the every-other-year gathering of representatives of the 171 presbyteries of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Having been one of those representatives from the Presbytery of the Western Reserve back in 2003, I can tell you that this week-long churchwide gettogether (called a "General Assembly" or just "G.A.") is part "family reunion," part "church policy legislation" and part "worship celebration."

Based on their numerical membership, each presbytery elects an equal number of ministers and elders to represent the entire presbytery in the deliberations of the G.A. In total, there are about 700 "commissioners" nationwide. The Presbytery of the Western Reserve is allowed to elect 2 ministers and 2 elders. In addition, we are able to send a "Young Adult Advisory Delegate." YAADs can participate in all discussions and activities; they are asked to cast "advisory votes" but their votes aren't counted in final tallies.

At G.A. the Presbyterian Church (USA) deals with internal matters (structure, funding, mission projects, theological perspectives) as well as external matters (speaking the Church's conscience on social-political, environmental, economic, moral and justice issues). Let me give you a few snapshots of things that happened at G.A. that will make a difference for Presbyterians in Rocky River, Ohio and elsewhere. (The following material is from the PC(USA)'s Office of the General Assembly.)

"Confession of Belhar" added to PC(USA)'s Book of Confessions

Thirty years after it was birthed in South Africa by the Dutch Reformed Mission Church (DRMC) during its battle against apartheid, the Confession of Belhar has been included in the Book of Confessions of the PC(USA). After a four-year-long process of study and votes by the General Assembly in 2014 and then ratification by the 171 presbyteries, this year's G.A. voted overwhelmingly (540-33) to make "Belhar" the denomination's 12th recognized confession... and the first originating in the southern hemisphere. It focuses on themes of justice, unity, and reconciliation, which are just as important today in the U.S. as they were thirty years ago, when Belhar was approved by the DRMC in the midst of South Africa's apartheid regime.

Commitment to peacemaking reaffirmed

After a six-year churchwide discernment process, the G.A. approved a lengthy report underscoring the centrality of peacemaking to Christian faith and promising to "practice boldly the things that make for peace."

"Risking Peace in a Violent World: Affirmations for Presbytery Consideration" was ordered by the G.A. in 2010 to "seek clarity as to God's call to the church to embrace nonviolence as its fundamental response to the challenges of violence, terror, and war."

The report calls for Presbyterians at all levels of the church to employ insights to respond to and prevent violence on the local, national, and international levels through prayer, direct action, and advocacy.

"Regret" expressed for harm to LGBT members

Declining a proposal that proposed to admit to and apologize for *harming* the lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender community, commissioners instead opted to express *deep regret* for ways that those minorities of "God's beloved children" have been led to feel that they stand outside the grace of God and are unwelcome in the denomination.

At the same time, the resolution expressed the deep sorrow of all in the PC (USA) who have left the fellowship of the church, and expressed appreciation to those who have maintained relationships despite profound disagreement.

Calling for deeper conversations about theological differences, the resolution (passed by a 463-51 vote) calls upon Presbyterians to seek reconciliation and to reach out to those who have been marginalized across the spectrum of theological understanding.

Move to divest from fossil fuel companies defeated

The PC(USA) [and its Board of Pensions for retired church workers] will continue to invest in fossil-fuel companies after overwhelmingly turning back an overture to begin divestment immediately. Instead, it will continue the process of selective, phased divestment that begins with full corporate engagement.

Bill Somplatsky-Jarman, the denomination's Associate for Mission Responsibility Through Investment (MRTI), told commissioners that divestment could well reduce Presbyterians' ability to persuade energy companies to act in environmentally responsible ways—one of the purposes of MRTI.

"In the real world of corporate engagement, the more stock you own the more power you have," Somplatsky-Jarman said. "You are treated much more seriously by companies that are skeptical of what you are asking for."

"Teaching Elder" out, "Minister of Word and Sacrament" back in

After several hours of debate, commissioners voted to ask presbyteries to reverse an action taken in 2012 and ratify a proposed amendment to the Book of Order that would restore the previous nomenclature for "ordered ministry." If approved by a majority of the denomination's 171 presbyteries:

- those now called "teaching elders" once again would be known as "ministers of Word and Sacrament;"
- "ruling elders" would be "elders;"
- and "commissioned ruling elders" [these are specially-trained elders authorized to serve temporarily as ministers] would be "commissioned pastors."
- ["Deacons" are still "deacons!"]

Two historic moments

Thanks to a rule change approved two years ago, for the first time in its 227-year history the G.A. elected Co-Moderators instead of a Moderator and Vice-Moderator. What's more, it was the PC(USA)'s first all-women moderatorial ticket. Rev. Denise Anderson (Washington D.C.) and Rev. Jan Edmiston (Chicago) will blaze trails in this new relationship as they represent the PC(USA) for the next two years.

The other historic moment occurred because of the retirement of the popular and very effective Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, the Rev. Gradye Parsons. Gradye had served as Stated Clerk for the past 8 years.

To replace him, the G.A. elected J. Herbert Nelson, who is the first black man selected to serve as the top ecclesial officer of the nation's largest Reformed body, a largely white denomination. "This is a powerful day, a powerful day in my life and for many people of color who did not envision the possibility of this ever happening," Nelson told the G.A., adding that he asked only one thing: "Work with me and pray with me—and not on me!—and we'll get some things done in the name of the Lord."

Healthy Happenings

... Notes from the Parish Nurse

Dear Friends and Family,

Greetings! I would like to share some important information about the prevention, diagnosis and treatment of Hepatitis. Hepatitis is an inflammatory condition of the liver and it's commonly caused by a viral infection. There are five different types of hepatitis; A, B, C, D, and E. Hepatitis A is a milder version of the disease, and hepatitis C and D are more severe. Hepatitis A and E are normally contracted from eating contaminated food or drinking contaminated water. Hepatitis B, C, and D are contracted through contaminated blood. These forms of hepatitis can be either acute or chronic. Types B and C usually become chronic. Lets looks a little closer at each type of hepatitis:

Hepatitis A This type of hepatitis is most commonly transmitted by consuming food or water contaminated by feces from a person infected with hepatitis A.

Hepatitis B This type is transmitted through puncture wounds or contact with infectious body fluids, such as blood, saliva, or semen. Injection drug use, having sex with an infected partner, or sharing razors with an infected person increase your risk of getting hepatitis B.

Hepatitis C Hepatitis C is transmitted through direct contact with infected body fluids, typically through injection drug use and sexual contact.

Hepatitis D Hepatitis D is a serious liver disease caused by contract through puncture wounds or contact with infected blood. Hepatitis D is a rare form of hepatitis that occurs in conjunction with hepatitis B infection. It's very uncommon in the United States.

Hepatitis E Hepatitis E is a waterborne disease and is mainly found in areas with poor sanitation and is typically caused by ingesting fecal matter. This disease is uncommon in the United States.

Precautions for Hepatitis include practicing good hygiene as one key way to avoid contracting hepatitis. If you're traveling to a developing country, you should avoid: drinking local water, ice, seafood, raw fruit and vegetables. Hepatitis contracted through contaminated blood can be prevented by: not sharing drug needles, not sharing razors, not using someone else's toothbrush and not touching spilled blood.

Signs and symptoms of acute hepatitis appear quickly. They include: fatigue, flu-like symptoms, dark urine, pale clay colored stool, abdomen pain, loss of appetite, unexplained weight loss, yellow skin and eyes which may be signs of jaundice. Since chronic hepatitis B and C develops slowly, these signs and symptoms may be too subtle to notice and may not occur until liver damage occurs. Hepatitis is diagnosed by physical exam, blood work, liver function test, ultrasound and liver biopsy. Treatment options vary depending on what form of hepatitis you have and what caused the infection. You can prevent some forms of hepatitis through immunizations or lifestyle precautions.

Complications of chronic hepatitis B or C can often lead to more serious health problems. Because the virus primarily affects the liver, people with chronic hepatitis B or C are at risk for: chronic liver disease, cirrhosis or scarring of the liver and in rare cases, cancer of the liver or hepatocellular carcinoma. When the liver stops functioning normally, liver failure can occur. Complications of liver failure include: bleeding disorders, a buildup of fluid in the abdomen, increased blood pressure in portal veins that enter the liver and kidney failure. Hepatic encephalopathy, which can involve fatigue, memory loss, and diminished mental abilities due to the build-up of toxins that affect the brain, can also occur. People with chronic hepatitis C are encouraged to avoid alcohol because it can accelerate liver disease and failure. Certain supplements, prescription, and over-the-counter medications can also affect liver function. If you have chronic hepatitis C, check with your doctor before taking any new medications

There are other possible causes of hepatitis. These include autoimmune hepatitis and hepatitis that occurs as a secondary result of medications, drugs, toxins, and alcohol. Autoimmune hepatitis is a disease that occurs when your body makes antibodies against your liver tissue.
