# Why does our church observe an "Advent Sabbath?"

Please note that our Advent Sabbath is not a rigid and intractable decree; we encourage groups to have their social gatherings during December; we appreciate that our choir members give us the gift of rehearsal time in order to enrich our worship services; we realize that there will be occasions when a little "church business" must be transacted by some board or committee. But the concept remains helpful, reminding us to take time to reflect on how our world is blessed because we recognize God's indescribable gift of Incarnation (literally, "taking on flesh") by coming among us in the birth of Jesus of Nazareth.

# From Your Pastor

# **Inconvenient Christmas**

Christmas, either.

In your household, you may be swamped by preoccupations with getting everything ready. What constitutes "ready for Christmas" is different for each household:

- Some may have elaborate decorations outside the home, others may have intricate winter scenes depicted on fireplace mantels.
- \* Some may have a Christmas card address list that fills both sides of a paper, while others have lists of people for whom Christmas cookies will be baked and wrapped and delivered.
- \* Some may be strategizing to keep unwrapped gifts out of sight of curious young eyes, while others may be preparing the house for the arrival of family... or packing suitcases for travel.

With only Parker the Dog sharing the house with us these days, getting the Fancher household "ready" for Christmas is a little simpler than it used to be. Getting the Battersea Basilica ready for Christmas includes decorating the outside of the house (I put up a star and a few strings of lights... done!), and putting up the Christmas tree (I usually get to it by mid-December), and Mary finalizing all arrangements and rehearsals for musical performances for her school and church jobs, and Mary doing almost all of the Christmas shopping for our family, and me preparing 8 or 9 worship services.

When it comes to "getting ready" for Christmas, we all have things on our minds.

Except, perhaps, Christmas itself.

onsider this simple question: what is a "day?" I can give you several

A day is the 24 hour period that begins

- one second after 12 o'clock midnight.
- \* Or, from the time we wake up until the time we go to sleep, that's a "day"
- \* Or, a day is from when the sun comes up until when the sun goes down.

In the world Jesus was born into, people had a different concept of what constituted a "day." For them, a day "began" at sunset, not at sunrise. That way of thinking was as normal to them as it seems strange to us

But you might recall that the Jewish Sabbath observance began at sundown on Friday and ended at sundown on Saturday. Now you know why—that constituted a "day" for those ancient people. As a holdover to modern times, the fact that most Christian traditions have services on Christmas *Eve* rather than on Christmas *Day* may reflect that ancient notion that the new day begins when the sun goes down. In other words, Christmas Day begins at sunset on Christmas Eve.

But our customary worship each week doesn't occur in the nighttime; we usually gather for worship during the daylight hours. What's more, our customary worship is not on a fixed date of the calendar like December 24<sup>th</sup> but *every* week "early on Sunday morning" (see Luke 24:1).

Now, in case you haven't looked ahead at your calendar, at the end of December in 2016, our customary "early on Sunday morning" worship falls on... December 25<sup>th</sup>—that's right, Sunday worship will happen on Christmas Day this year!

You might say, "Hmmm..., well, doesn't that happen every 7 years anyway?" Actually, no. Because of the Leap Year phenomenon, Christmas Day falling on a Sunday occurs somewhere between every 5 and 11 years. It occurred most recently in 2011. The next time Christmas Day will be on a Sunday won't happen for 6 years, in 2022. After that, it won't happen again for another 11 years, in 2033!

S o this year gives you a rare opportunity to experience Christmas in a new way: wrapping your family's Christmas morning traditions around your custom of gathering for worship on the Sabbath, the Lord's Day, Sunday.

# When you include Sunday worship as part of your Christmas morning this year, what will you experience?

- Driving to worship you'll be delighted to notice how calm the world is on Christmas morning.
- \* In our sanctuary you'll be with people who are in an even happier mood than usual!
- \* During the service you'll hear a humorous, heart-warming story about a Christmas pageant-gone-haywire.

# How will Sunday morning's Christmas Day worship be different from Christmas Eve?

- \* Worship will be more casual.
- \* You can be more casual (since we never have a "dress code" for worship, even pajamas are welcomed on Christmas Day!). Don't bother to shave.

  Come without make-up. Wear a cap or scarf over your hair. Who cares! God loves you, and so does everyone at church!

# What will you give up?

- \* You'll give up a portion of your morning to allow for travel time to and from church, plus about 45-50 minutes for the service.
- \* But I'm confident that you'll like how your Christmas tradition was enriched because of the rare opportunity to gather for worship on Christmas Day.

How old will your kids be—how old will *you* be—if you miss this chance in 2016 and have to wait until 2022—or until 2033!—to include worship as part of your Christmas morning?

See you in church in Advent... and Christmas Eve... and Christmas Day!



# ... Notes from the Parish Nurse

Dear Friends and Family,

The holidays can be a perfect or not-so-perfect time to get together with your family. Sometimes the not-so-perfect can depend on how well your family functions as a whole or separately. Poor communication and difficult personalities can cause stress during holidays as families try to negotiate where and when they will get together. This may be even more difficult for blended families as they try to figure out what will work for them. Here are some tips to create a happy, healthy and hopefully **stress-free holiday season for blended families.** 

Your children should always come first. It's easy to lose sight of what's important this holiday season when you're dealing with egos and animosity. What's really important isn't which parent gives the most gifts or has the most extravagant vacation plans. It's keeping the kids happy and out of the line of fire. Try talking to your children and stepchildren about the holidays. Ask them what their ideal holiday would look like. You might be surprised to discover that their ideal visitation plan is one you'd never even considered.

Divide up all the holidays at once. It may seem extreme to be talking about Valentine's Day when Christmas is right around the corner, but having everything set ahead of time gives all parties involved an opportunity to talk about which holidays are most important to them. Children will have a clear idea of where they'll be for which holiday and parents have time to emotionally prepare for holidays when the kids will be gone. Blended families with different religions will have different priorities. For example, while one parent may expect to be with their children on Christmas and Easter, the other may feel strongly that the children are with them to celebrate the Jewish High Holy Days.

**Communicate clearly.** It's not enough to decide that the children will spend Christmas morning with their father and New Year's Eve with their mother. Other details need to be worked out, too. Questions to ask for clarification include:

- Who is picking up the kids, where, and at what time?
- Will the parent who doesn't have the kids on a certain holiday have contact with them on that day?
- How will grandparents and step-grandparents be involved?
- When does the holiday start and end?

Clear communication also means not using your children as go-betweens. As difficult as it may be, try to speak directly to your ex about the schedule and any changes you're proposing

**Keep realistic expectations.** The reality is that no matter how hard you try to make the holidays per fect, someone is going to be unhappy with the arrangements you've made. It's better to keep celebrations low-key. Consider having family visit you at your home for the holidays so that you don't have to figure out how to be in six places at the same time.

Create new traditions. Each person who is a part of your blended family is used to their own holiday traditions with extended family. Since your family is different than it used to be, maybe your traditions should be too. While it's probably not a good idea to change everything from the food to the venue of your holiday celebration, starting with small changes is a good way to bring your family closer together. Start by taking inventory of what everybody in your blended family likes to do and work from there. It could be as simple as having three types of pie every year to meet everyone's tastes.

Remember the holiday shuffle can be very difficult for children and parents, especially if it's a relatively new arrangement. Adding an entirely new family to the mix is emotionally overwhelming and involves patience, compromise, trial and error and a true time commitment to work out the kinks.

# RRPC provides leadership gift for Dougbe River Presbyterian School of Liberia

Many congregations in the Presbytery of the Western Reserve have contributed to the progress of the Dougbe River Presbyterian School. The school opened in November 2012. Currently "DRPS" serves 154 boys and girls in a remote,

impoverished region of eastern Liberia. It is the first school ever in Twarbo Region along Liberia's border with Ivory Coast, They have benefitted from RRPC's Alternative Christmas Charity Bazaar the past few years.

Earlier this year the Trustees of the Presbytery of the Western Reserve announced a \$15,000 matching gift initiative for Dougbe River Presbyterian School for expansion of needed facilities including latrine improvements, an updated kitchen and cafeteria, and eventually a library. The presbytery would match gifts from any congregation or individual who donates to the project.

RRPC responded with a gift from our In His Name Fund, a "pastor's discretionary fund" used to address emergency needs of church members and others, as well as being used occasionally to meet emerging mission opportunities. Our pastor regularly consults with the Moderator of the Board of Deacons about potential significant expenditures from the IHN Fund. Together Jon and deacon Dianne Russell saw that the IHN Fund was carrying a very healthy cash balance and could easily afford to make a significant gift. Knowing that many churches in our presbytery would be unable to make any gift to this matching program, our church was able to make a \$5,000 gift toward the presbytery's \$15,000 matching grant initiative. Our gift helped DRPS meet their \$15,000 goal (they actually exceeded their goal by about \$3,000).

# Flowers... In His Name.. Endowment

At Christmas time, we like to make a special gift in honor or memory of loved ones. Rocky River Presbyterian Church (RRPC) offers three ways to remember someone special. We print these remembrances in the Christmas Sunday bulletin.

# The deadline for Christmas contributions is MONDAY, DEC. 12<sup>TH</sup>.

- 1) Holiday Flower Fund Contributions to the Holiday Flower Fund provide plants for our sanctuary (suggested minimum donation \$10 for a plant). The RRPC Deacons' sanctuary decorating group purchases adequate plants for a tasteful display. Following the last Christmas Eve service we encourage donors to pick out a plant (there will be plants of varying sizes and styles) suitable for giving to someone who is sick, shut-in or needing a lift in spirit! (Added bonus: Flower Fund money remaining, after buying Christmas flowers, is used for sanctuary flowers on Sundays without flower donations!)
- 2) In His Name (IHN) Fund This is a discretionary fund used by the pastor to address appeals for emergency assistance, special mission support and other unmet needs within or outside of our congregation. Donations to the IHN Fund may be in any amount.
- 3) RRPC General Endowment Fund This fund is an abiding endowment which is never decreased. All contributions add to the fund and generate increased interest income for the church. Donations to the RRPC General Endowment Fund may be in any amount.
