feminine hygiene kits means DAYS without school, DAYS without income, DAYS without leaving the house. The poverty cycle can be broken when girls stay in school.

Women, and girls discover their potential and self-value, are equal participants and agents of social change and are given opportunities to thrive, grow and contribute to their community's betterment while ensuring quality sustainable feminine hygiene. There are a lot of things in the world that are hard to change. THIS we can change. Together.

Five years ago, planning and implementation of the Days for Girls project to sew 65 washable personal hygiene kits was important to RRPC Presbyterian Women because it was an opportunity to serve others. When a community gets access to clean water, it can change just about everything. It can improve health, increase access to food, grow local economies, and help kids spend more time in school.



Imagine that there was no school for you... no school within 50 miles. That was what faced a boy who was born in Liberia. He scrapped, worked and even risked his life, having to leave home in order to gain an education.

Eventually he arrived in Cleveland where he finished his education, found work, married, and settled down. Then he told his Presbyterian pastor, 'We need to build a school in Liberia!"

That's how it started. Now the Dougbe ("Doo-BAY") River Presbyterian School is a reality. Built on 150 acres of land given to the school by the local leaders and financed entirely by donations—including a donation from RRPC—the Dougbe River Presbyterian School opened its doors to 130 students last year!

Their vision is "to reach out to rural people with education and Christianity. Our vision is that Liberian young people empowered by education can develop their nation and profoundly reduce poverty. We reach out to Christian and non-Christian people. Our school is open to all children regardless of religion, age, race, gender, or ethnic group. We also stand for peace, unity, reconciliation, honesty and development."

North Coast Community Health Center

"North Coast Health Ministry" (now "North Coast Community Health Center" affiliated with Neighborhood Family Practice) was founded in 1986 to bridge the health care gap for the low income uninsured on Cleveland's West Side. Due to the 2014 changes in health care funding in the United States, there was a concern at North Coast that there would be a need to provide health care to people on Medicaid and Medicare. Now North Coast Community Health Center provides care to those without coverage and also to those with Medicaid and Medicare.

With the support of over 100 volunteer doctors, nurses and other caregivers, they are able to provide preventative care, chronic disease management, as well as office visits for general illness and injury. Prescription medication assistance, diabetes supplies and specialty referrals are also provided. For every dollar donated to North Coast CHC, we deliver \$10 worth of health care to our patients, thanks to the contributions of our volunteers and our partnerships with local hospitals. We make your dollars grow.

By supporting North Coast Community Health Center, you help provide health care to almost 3,000 men, women and children in Western Cuyahoga and Eastern Lorain counties without health insurance and without access to health care. We believe health care is as basic a human need as food and shelter. Access to affordable health care for these individuals can mean the difference between life and death.

The Metanoia Project

-Helping the Homeless in Cleveland

Addressing homelessness is a year-long effort! We work throughout the year to provide resources including clothing, food, access to medical help and transportation to our guests...but we can't do it alone! The Metanoia Project needs your help. Your monetary contributions are used to **directly benefit** those that we serve.

The *Homeless Hospitality Center* provides overnight respite for 80 guest a night from mid Nov. to April. Trauma brought on by homelessness is addressed through the *Courage to Change* program which provides treatment of the mind, body and spirit, job readiness, work ethics, and works to find continued mentorship for our guests.

Our Street Outreach Program allows us to form vital relationships with the homeless population. Once general trust has been established, we provide clothing, food and transportation to medical facilities – with the ultimate goal of getting them into permanent housing.

Our *Huddle Summer Program* emphasizes physical wellness and introduces many to healthy lifestyle options including yoga, art therapy, juicing and gardening. We operate our summer garden out of Kentucky Gardens (West 38th and Franklin). Seeing new life grow from the soil is rewarding for their physical health as it is mentally.

When someone in your family is dealing with cancer, having nutritious meals provided to you is an enormous relief and source of encouragement. At the Village Project we are privileged to walk alongside our clients during their individual cancer journeys. Village Project provides meals and extended services to individuals and their families dealing with cancer in Avon, Avon Lake, Bay Village, Rocky River, and Westlake. Clients receive nutritious meals designed with health, healing and maintaining strength in mind. Our food is free of processed sugar, white flour and red meat. Meals are prepared by high school students, under the supervision of adult cooks. Each person in the client family will receive three full meals with side dishes and a dessert.

"Delivery angels" check in with our clients each week when delivering meals, ensuring their needs are being met or haven't changed. In addition to meals, weekly deliveries contain a letter detailing the menu and ingredients, cards made by children and signed by those who prepared and packaged the meals that week, and often homemade gifts donated by volunteers. During the summer season, vases painted by children hold flowers grown in our organic garden.

Village Project runs on volunteers: student cooks, adult cooks, prep teams, delivery angels. We will help you find a position fitting your specific skill set.

The Greater Cleveland Food Bank is the largest hunger relief organization in Northeast Ohio having provided literally millions of meals to hungry people in Cuyahoga, Ashtabula, Geauga, Lake, Ashland and Richland counties.

The Greater Cleveland Food Bank solicits donated food and other products from food manufacturers, wholesalers, retailers and community groups. We also raise the funds necessary to purchase meals at the best rate to serve as many meals as possible to those in need. Each dollar provides four nutritious meals. Then we distribute the food to more than 800 partner agencies that serve those struggling with hunger in Northeast Ohio.

In the last fiscal year, the Food Bank made possible nearly 48 million meals to those struggling with hunger in our area. Almost one-third of the people that receive these meals are children under the age of 18 and 15 percent are people over the age of 65. In our area, one in five children is at risk of hunger. Fisher House guest suites each have a private bedroom and bath. There is a shared common kitchen, laundry area, dining room, living room, library, and toys for children. All homes are professionally furnished and decorated and are wheelchair accessible.

More than 1,000 local Cleveland donors including community organizations, Veteran Service Organizations, charitable foundations, and individuals combined with national donors over nearly 10 years to raise \$3.4 million. Fisher House Foundation constructed and gifted the houses to the U.S. Department of Veterans A airs to support the need in Northeast Ohio. With the support and land donation from the City of Cleveland and the Cuyahoga Land Bank, the official Land Transfer Ceremony took place June 30, 2017, the first step in beginning construction. The groundbreaking ceremony took place March 23, 2018, and the Greater Cleveland Fisher House opened its doors to its first guests Monday, June 10, 2019.

The Greater Cleveland Fisher House is part of VA Northeast Ohio Healthcare System. The healthcare system delivers comprehensive, seamless health care and social services for nearly 112,600 Veterans at 18 locations across Northeast Ohio. The Louis Stokes Cleveland VA Medical Center is the healthcare system's hub and operates more than 20 national and regional referral services for Veterans.

From playful pup to loval working dog!

A puppy is sponsored, named, placed in the arms of a highly skilled prison inmate "raiser" who is prepped with textbooks and supplies. Each inmate is carefully screened by the staff of the correctional facility and by **Puppies Behind Bars** personnel. In order to qualify for the puppy program, the inmate has to have a clean prison record for at least 2 years and must be considered both reliable and trustworthy by prison officials.

Throughout the 18 months that the dog spends in prison they go through many collars and leashes and devour lots of dog food. The dog and inmate raiser attend weekly classes where they learn to use her training toys. Each dog leaves prison for routine veterinary check-ups and goes out with specially trained volunteers on socialization outings, exposing her to family life, restaurants, stores and nursing homes. Upon graduating, she earns her working dog certification and is ready to serve a disabled individual or law enforcement official. The programs bring the love and healing of dogs to hundreds of individuals every year. The dogs bring hope and pride to their raisers, and independence and security to those they serve.

Hugme Comfort Dolls

Hugme Dolls are a comfort doll always to be given in love.

Hugme Comfort Dolls are a charitable outreach ministry dedicated to distributing hand-made huggable dolls to children and even adults who are involved in a crisis situation. Dolls are often used as a therapeutic aid to help children that have been or still are victims of traumatic, lifealtering crisis. Hugme Comfort Dolls can be used by hospitals, police, firefighters, counselors, and other emergency/social services. They are simple, cheerful, and cuddly, with minimal features and hair, of no specific gender or skin color.

These dolls were first developed by a Presbyterian woman from Bartlesville, OK. The first 19 dolls were finished on May 18, 2013 and were among the relief supplies taken to the tornado-stricken towns of Shawnee and Moore, OK. The pattern and instructions are free. No dolls made from the original Hugme Doll pattern are ever to be sold.

RRPC plans to make several dozen of these dolls to give to emergency service and social workers to aid in crisis. Sewing machines and some fabrics were donated for this project by Mike Gero in memory of his late wife, RRPC member Dawn Fuller.

The One World Shop has been a loyal contributor to the Alternative Christmas Charity Bazaar event every year. Their mission is to educate and engage our community on Fair Trade and related global social justice issues by providing a variety of educational outreach programs and a vibrant marketplace for artisan handmade goods.

In 1973 a group at Lakewood Presbyterian Church was motivated after reading the publication, "The Alternative Christmas Catalog", which was the effort of one Methodist layperson sharing his frustration with what had happened in our culture to the celebration of Christmas. As an alternative, he proposed using the criteria, of "person-affirming, life supporting" in our decisions about how to celebrate Christmas. One way of doing this would be to "affirm and support" persons living currently in poverty who have no market for what they produce. By purchasing gifts from such "alternative trade" sources and offering a fair price, one empowers these people to support their families, have a sense of self-dignity and not have to depend on hand-outs.

For five years the Lakewood group held "alternative Christmas fairs" across Cuyahoga County until in 1979, when the opportunity to move permanently into a storefront arose and so One World Shop was established.

A visit to the store at 1932 Detroit Rd. in Rocky River will delight you with the wide variety of truly unique and beautiful items from around the world. Your purchases from the store will give you another opportunity to provide a helping hand to those in need.
