PASTOR'S MESSAGE

Pastor's Pen,

"See, the former things have come to pass, and new things I now declare" (Isaiah 42:9).

These words were spoken to the Israelite people who were held in captivity in Babylon. A generation before (587 BC) the Babylonians invaded the Promised Land and conquered the city of Jerusalem which was their capital and destroyed their temple. From there two things happened: people fled the city and settled elsewhere. Others, that is the more prominent citizens, were taken prisoner and deported to Babylon so they could not take back control and rebuild Jerusalem.

Then in 539 BC, King Cyrus of Persia conquered Babylon and he allowed the Hebrew people to go back to Judah. Many of these making that journey to Jerusalem had been born in Babylon during the 40-year period of exile, so they had never personally seen their homeland of Judah and the great city of Jerusalem. But for years, those exiles had heard story after story told by their parents and grandparents – stories about the peace and prosperity of Judah, stories about the beauty of the land and the magnificence of Jerusalem's Temple.

And they were thinking, now we can turn back the clock and restore our land to what it was in the past. Let's make Jerusalem what our parents described it to be. We will rebuild our city and replace every stone in the walls of the Temple that had been destroyed and we will make an exact replica of what we had before.

But God had other plans for them: "The former things have come to pass, and new things I now declare." And that new thing for God's people would be this: that they be a light to the nations. I have given you as a covenant to the people, a light to the nations, to open the eyes of the blind, to bring out the prisoners from the dungeon, from the prison those who sit in darkness" (Isaiah 42:7). God was not looking for them to turn the clock back, but forward. They were now called, not to hunker down and avoid those nations which surrounded them, they were to be a light to them.

The beginning of a new year is a reminder that "the former things have come to pass," and the same God who provided new beginnings for his people in the Old Testament continues to create new beginnings for his people today. This means being forward looking people. Biblically, to be a part of God's plans always means a willingness to participle in a future that is different than the past. When we get stuck in the past, the result is likely to be an unclaimed future blessing. Let's be looking for what new thing God will declare in 2025 for the

JANUARY 5: On this Sunday we will look at the significance of the Wisemen in early narratives of the life of Jesus, and will explore why the Wisemen were delayed in getting to Jesus. The Sermon is called "The Wisemen Were Late" and the text is Matthew 2:1-12. We will also be celebrating the sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

JANUARY 12: This Sunday begins the first in a threepart series on the three Temptations of Jesus as described in the Gospel of Matthew. Following the baptism of Jesus, we are told, "He was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil" (Matthew 4:1). On this day we will examine the first one, when the tempter said to Jesus, "If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of bread" (Matthew 4:3). What might this say about our perspective on material possessions? This day will also include a Service of Baptism Renewal (see explanation below).

JANUARY 19: The second temptation of Jesus described in Matthew's gospel is found in Matthew 4:5-7, when he is taken to the pinnacle of the temple and the tempter says to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down" (Matthew 4:6). What does this say about how our faith relates to personal security?

JANUARY 26: Matthew's gospel portrays Jesus being taken to a high mountain and shown all the kingdoms of the world. The tempter says, "All these I will give to you if you fall down and worship me" (Matthew 4:9). What does this say about our faith as it relates to power?

A SERVICE OF BAPTISM RENEWAL: January 12 is a Sunday we recall the Baptism of Jesus and what that meant, and we will be providing a Service of Baptism Renewal recall our own baptism and the meaning of it by way of a Service of Baptism Renewal. During worship we will provide the questions which are asked when a person is baptized, and then we as a congregation will "renew" these baptismal vows by answering them as a congregation. For those of us who were baptized as infants, we have no memory of hearing these questions, as they would have been addressed to our parents. The renewal service will be a way to hear these questions again and to reaffirm their meaning for our discipleship today. This a day to remember our baptism and to be strengthened in

The Annual Meeting of the Congregation members will be **Sunday, January 26**, immediately following the worship service. We are obligated to pay our per capita regardless of how much we receive toward it. The total Rocky River Church owes is **\$12,600**, based on the membership roll as of December 31, 2023.
