Pastor's Pen

For the five Sundays in the month of August we will be directing our attention to the Old Testament Book of Genesis during our 9:30 a.m. summer worship time. We will be looking at five episodes which occur in this ancient book and see what they have to say for us today. Genesis means "beginning," and that's where the book of Genesis starts: "In the beginning, when God created the heavens and the earth" (Genesis 1:1-2). The Genesis account affirms the goodness of God's creation. "God saw everything he had made, and indeed, it was very good" (Genesis 1:31). This includes the creation of us human beings.

Yet, more than being just another good thing God created, Genesis makes it clear that the human person is set apart from the rest of creation: "God created humankind in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them" (Genesis 1:27). This is to say we humans are different from all the other creatures of the earth in that there is a piece of God's design in all of us.

And we have to ask ourselves what this means in terms of how we relate to one another and to our Creator. We are set apart from the rest of creation and God has certain expectations of us because of it.

Other aspects of the Book of Genesis concern how human beings are prone to rebel against God's good purposes for their lives. We see this in the account of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden when they ate of the forbidden fruit. Why would they be tempted to do that which is forbidden, knowing their disobedience would bring misery upon their lives? This prompts us to ask why we are prone to do the same. Even though Genesis is an ancient book, it has much to say about human nature and how much it has remained the same.

Moreover, this ancient book tells us a great deal about God's nature and how God continues to seek out and love us humans even as we humans fail to seek out and love our Creator. We see God reaching out to Abraham with whom he made his covenant (which means promise): "I will make you a great nation, and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing" (Genesis 12:2). God made this promise, not because Abraham deserved it, or because he was the most qualified to receive it, but because God chose to be gracious to him. This would become a theme throughout the Old Testament and the Bible as a whole.

So, Genesis may be an ancient book, but it has much to say that's relevant to us today!

WORSHIP IN AUGUST

AUGUST 3: This Sunday is the first in the Five Episodes in Genesis series, and it starts with the Creation Account: Genesis 1:1-10; 24-31. The message is called, "In the Beginning..." We will also be celebrating the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper on that day as we do the first Sunday of each month.

AUGUST 10: The second episode we are looking at in the Book of Genesis concerns Adam and Eve's disobedience and the consequences which follow (Genesis 3:1-13). The message is called, "Apples and Snakes."

AUGUST 17: This week will focus on the story of two brothers, Cain and Abel (Genesis 4:1-16). Both brothers brought an offering to the Lord and Cain's offering is rejected while Abel's offering is accepted. We can sympathize with Cain, as we have all experienced rejection and have struggled with how to deal with it. The message for this day is called "Descendants of Cain."

AUGUST 24: In the fourth episode in Genesis, we will look at God's covenant with Abram, later given the name Abraham. Here God promises that he will make of his lineage a great nation. Why would Abraham be the one God chooses? The message for this day is "An Impractical Covenant" (Genesis 17:1-8;15-22).

AUGUST 31: This Sunday is about Jacob. He was, among other things, a thief and a con-artist. Yet God chose him be the continued link in God's covenant plan. The focus for this Sunday will be on Jacob's encounter with a divine being who "wrestled with him until daybreak" (Genesis 32:24). The message is called, "A Wrestler of Angels."

Personal and Property Safety

Did you know that you can purchase a lock box for your home? What is a lock box you ask. This is a key box installed by your city's fire department near your front door. You provide a key to your home, and it goes into the lock box. In case of a medical or fire emergency the first responders can unlock the lock box and gain access to your home without having to break the front door or window.

Rocky River residents can purchase the lock box at the local ACE Hardware, for wholesale cost. You provide the clerk with your city name, and they provide the Box. Then call the Fire Department, NON-EMERGENCY number, and they will schedule a time to install the box. You can also send an email to fpo@rrcity.com if you are in Rocky River. This email address is changing soon, but your email will be forwarded to the new address. A sticker is added to your door area to notify the fire department of the lock box. Installation and chatting with the fire official took 15 minutes.

Fire Department Service Comminuty Service:

The fire representative told me that they also provide a community service for changing light bulbs and other home chores. He said they don't do gutters and roofs. They would prefer to send someone out to assist with light bulbs, than send an emergency squad to respond to someone who has fallen off a ladder and injured themselves. So check with your local fire department to see if they can assist you, before climbing on the ladder yourself.
